



HOW DO I SPONSOR A NEW MEMBER?

The most significant way to experience the richness of the Elks Initiation is to sponsor a friend into our organization. Our order is selective, to maintain the quality of our membership and thereby perpetuate the good works that stem from our rigorously guarded character. To be eligible for membership in the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, the person must be a citizen of the United States over the age of 21 who believes in God.

The proposed member can be sponsored by any current member in good standing from any lodge in the country. They'll also need two other Elks to be their references. The Elk who proposes an individual for membership should provide them with a copy of the Membership Application, or email them a link to the online version of the form. If they are applying via hard copy, they can return their completed application to the Lodge Secretary.


Their application will be read at a regular Lodge meeting. It will then be forwarded to the Investigating Committee, who will call the proposed new member and set up a time for the new member and sponsor to meet with the committee so that they can interview the proposed new member.

After the interview is concluded, the committee will report to the Lodge concerning the membership. The members will be given a notice not less than 10 days nor more than two months before the vote will be taken. When the vote is concluded, the proposed member will be notified and asked to present themselves and their spouse for indoctrination. During indoctrination, they will learn more about the Order's programs and charities. They will also be told during the program the date they will be initiated. After initiation as an Elk, they can take part in all meetings and social functions of the Lodge.

If for any reason their application is rejected, they can submit a new application for membership after six months from the date of rejection.



FIREWORKS AS A JULY 4TH TRADITION

It's hard to imagine Independence Day without fireworks. But how



did this tradition get started? The earliest forms of pyrotechnics can be traced to around 2,000 years ago in China. People are said to have roasted bamboo stalks until they would turn black and sizzle, and the air inside the hollow stalks would explode. Between 600-900 A.D., Chinese alchemists took that idea to the next level by filling bamboo shoots with gunpowder made from saltpeter (potassium nitrate, sulfur, and carbon acquired from charcoal), and throwing them into a fire pit. Steel dust or cast-iron shavings were added to make them sparkle. These firecrackers were often used during New Year Festivals and weddings to scare off evil spirits. As the ingredients for gunpowder spread to the West, so did fireworks. They became a part of official celebrations, from the annual fireworks display in Rome to the 1533 coronation of Anne Boleyn as Queen of England. So it was no surprise that, as soon as July Fourth began to be celebrated as America's Independence Day, fireworks were part of the plan. After all, John Adams did say he hoped the anniversary of independence would be marked for years to come by "guns" and "bonfires" and "illuminations." Because the first July 4 fireworks display happened in the middle of the Revolutionary War, some historians believe they were supposed to be a "morale booster." The celebrations at the time would have also included the firing of cannons and guns, adding to the explosive nature of the festivities. With the war's end and increasing concern for public safety, those firearms were eventually phased out of the celebrations and replaced almost entirely by the fireworks.

Today, Americans spend somewhere around \$1 billion on fireworks each July 4, allowing for a nationwide celebration of independence John Adams would surely have appreciated.
